With a full orchestra along with a cast of 67 of the schools most talented singers and actors, this production is sure to be nothing short of inspirational. In this production, Floyd Central students have the unique opportunity to work alongside two experienced actors in the roles of Jean Valjean and Javert. Alonzo Richmond (Valjean) and Phil Thomas (Javert) are both experienced in the world of professional theatre as well as theatre education. Mr. Richmond performs regularly in the Kentuckiana area and is also the Director of Theatre Arts at Silver Creek High School. Mr. Thomas, Band teacher at Highland Hills Middle School and Adjunct Lecturer at Indiana University Southeast, last appeared on the Floyd Central stage in 1999 as "God" in Children of Eden. You can tell that they go home and put in great preparation after each rehearsal."

Angel Hampton, Choral Director for Floyd Central, is the musical director and is assisted by the Highland Hills Choral Director, David Stone. The orchestra, which consists of both students and adults, is conducted by Jon Ledgerwood. Michael Nevitt is the lighting designer, assisted by junior Lydia Villiger. Performers include junior Madeline Coffey (Cosette), senior Collin Jackson (Marius), senior Jade Dailey (Eponine), junior Allyson Nicole Jones (Fantine), senior Clay Gulley (Thenardier),

junior Mary Hayes (Madame Thenardier), and junior Ryan Bickett (Enjolras).
