Lloyd Byron Garriott

A local airplane pilot died Wednesday May 7, 2014. Lloyd Byron Garriott was born October 29, 1922, of parents Homer A. Garriott and Mother, Christina.

He is survived by his wife: Betty Jean; Daughter: Linda Lee Miller of Corvallis, Montana; Son: Dr. Charles Richard Garriott of Mission, South Dakota and 3 grandchildren. He is also survived by a sister-in-law: Noreen Garriott of Franklin, Indiana; Nephew: Mark Garriott and Niece Susan Cantrell, who also have children. Many other relatives live locally and scattered widely across the country and Canada.

“Barney” grew up on the family farm on North Elk Creek Road in Scottsburg, Indiana. He graduated from Little York High in 1940 and began a career in Aviation. After graduating from Lincoln Aeronautical Institute in Lincoln, Nebraska, He was stationed in Washington, D.C. during the war. He was an Aviation Mechanic and Flight Engineer, flying out of what is now Reagan Airport. While still a Mechanic, he had occasion to do maintenance work on President Franklin D. Roosevelt’s plane, prior to the President’s trip to Casablanca to meet with Churchill and Stalin. He recalls many other experiences from flights overseas, but his group was credited with flying special ammunition into Africa, which led to the defeat of German General Rommel.

After the war, Barney transferred to domestic flying, based in Kansas City, Missouri. His experience led to working in Engineering at the TWA Overhaul Base for ten years, as well as doing Flight Test work for four years. TWA sent him on several lecture trips to various flight crew domiciles, to instruct on how to diagnose aircraft engine problems. During one such trip he was seated by a window and noticed an unusual flame pattern from the exhaust on one engine. He told the flight crew to radio ahead to the next fueling point and have mechanics look for a particular problem. The mechanics were able to fix the problem during the normal fueling time.

Aviation was only one of his interests. Betty and Barney were quite active in Church work, particularly Mission Overseas. On a round-the-world flight in 1975, they traveled around Thailand and noted many poor Chinese people in the hill tribes of Thailand up north near the Burmese border. There was no milk for the children, so the Garriotts were instrumental in giving a small herd of cattle to cure this diet deficiency.

Barney was interested in MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship), since the death of Nate Saint and four other missionaries were killed by the Auca Indians of Ecuador. Nate’s son went back and lived with the very ones who killed his Father. “The Point of the Spear” is a recent movie about his continuing the mission story.

The Garriotts saw the need for additional Missionary pilots and were instrumental in getting three natives of Zaire (Republic of Congo) to take flight training. An aircraft was procured and training began. One washed out when the instructor shut off the engine during flight. The native panicked and was deemed unsuitable. Another completed the

course successfully, but the Government refused to license as he was too short. The third, Voombe, was successful in being an active pilot for MAF. This was no small feat, considering these natives were about only two generations from headhunters. Barney and Betty still support MAF and last year had a pilot from Zaire come and tell the MAF story to First Baptist Church in Salem.

Photography was also a hobby of Barney's, as well as studying Archaeology and history of the Assyrian captivity of the Jewish nation.

This background led to visiting many of the world's famous museums. This resulted in three seminaries receiving slides and lecture notes for their audio-visual libraries.

In 1992, the Garriotts retired to the family homestead farm in Gibson Township. This farm has been in the Garriott family since 1818.

Barney and Betty like to travel in Indiana. They noted some barns, particularly in Indiana, have pictures of ducks, horses, etc. woven into the roof patterns on the shingles. The idea came to Barney--why not an airplane? Consequently, a 20 foot model of his favorite airplane, the triple-tailed Constellation, was cut out of wallboard and details painted on the model. This was screwed to the side of his red barn (corn crib) so that people driving north on Elk Creek Road from Old Highway 56, come over a hill and there in front of them is an airplane making a left turn. It subsequently weathered and curled up, so it was removed. But so many adverse comments were received, Barney had to repair it and put it back up. Two former TWA people from California came to see it and were disappointed because it was not there.
