He also served as president of the Sunset Community School organization and was a lifetime member of Phi Epsilon fraternity.

Dr. Noe received many honors during his career, which included being named twice as Broward County Track Coach of the Year. He served as head referee for the Florida High School boys' and girls' state track meets for 30 years. He was inducted into the Florida High School Track Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1990 and into the Florida High School Activities Association Hall of Fame in 1996.
