Rosalind English Memorial Park in Lexington will be packed with action during the two-day annual Old Settlers' Days festival in Lexington.

During the 132nd festival, set for Friday and Saturday, June 11 and 12, visitors can browse the arts and crafts booths and the flea market as well as enjoy firemen's games, Little League baseball games, a talent contest, live musical entertainment, a corn hole tournament and the firemen's famed fish fry and other concessions.

According to schedules released, food concessions, including the firemen's fish fry, will open at 11 a.m. on June 11. Craft and flea market booths will open at 4 p.m. that first day, and stage entertainment will begin at 5 p.m. with DJ Bobby Deal to provide music for an hour to start off the evening.

At 6 p.m., members of the band Fuzzy Albino will play.

From 7 to 7:45 p.m., the Little Bit of Soul Band will perform; Imagine That Band is scheduled for 8 to 8:45 p.m.. Following that group will be the Crazy Jane Band from 9 to 10:45 p.m. Deal will end the evening with music from 10:45 to 11 p.m.

On Saturday, the Captain's Romp 5k run/walk is scheduled. Registration for the event will take place at the old Englishton Park past the big barn. All are asked to use the south drive to access parking. Registration will take place at 7 a.m. followed by the event at 8 a.m.

From 12 noon to 1 p.m., the Talent Contest registration is set at the ballpark's stage. The competition is for anyone age 19 or younger. Those placing first through third will receive plaques. Call Bobby Deal at 889-3710 for more information.

The corn hole tournament, which offers a \$500 first place prize, will begin at 1 p.m. in the park grounds. The Talent Contest will also start at 1 p.m. and continue on stage through 3 p.m.

Bands will begin performing on stage starting at 3:30 p.m. with the Marble Hill Bluegrass Band. Next will be John Cornett and Cabin Creek at 4:30 p.m.
