Rice has been a We Care volunteer for several years as has his mother, Tammy. All We Care volunteers are special people, noted Miller. "We heard the comment, 'It makes you feel good to help someone who might have otherwise been cold this winter,' and we certainly agree with that," she said.

Now that the large auction is completed, a wrap-up event is scheduled to start at 6 p.m. on Friday night, December 10, at the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Scott County Post 6582, on U.S. Highway 31 between Austin and Scottsburg. Everyone is welcome to attend this event and see if they can grab some bargains from items not claimed or which didn't get into the regular auction. All will be sold to the highest bidders.

Auctioneer Tommy Cull will conduct the follow-up event, encouraging people present to bid often and loudly. The We Care food booth will be open at the VFY that evening. A variety of hot soups, chili, hot dogs, desserts, coffee, hot chocolate and soft drinks will be available for purchase.
