

Autumn on the River to celebrate 20th festival, Bethlehem's 200th birthday this weekend in Bethlehem

The 20th annual Autumn on the River Festival will be held this weekend, October 20 and 21, in historic Bethlehem. In addition to the festival local residents will be encouraged to help celebrate the 200th birthday of the historic little town of Bethlehem.

"The excitement of the birthday celebration and Autumn on the River is growing," stated David Abbott, Sr., co-chair of this year's Autumn on the River Festival. "The committee has been busy planning the celebration and birthday party all year. We are looking forward to this weekend."

The committee will celebrate the birthday of Bethlehem with a birthday cake. The birthday cake for everyone to enjoy will be located inside the old school house. The cake will be offered in the Seminar Room along with a meet and greet area. You will need a ticket to receive your free piece of birthday cake. Tickets will be available at the Information Booth. The birthday cake is sponsored in part by The New Washington State Bank and Historic Bethlehem. Volunteers will begin serving the cake at 10 a.m. on Saturday and will serve the cake till it is gone.

This year's Autumn on the River Festival will feature some of the great activities and entertainment local residents have come to love. The ever popular band, The Marlinaires will again bring their talent to Bethlehem, along with The Joymakers and Under Construction. The musical talent will have a brand new stage to perform on this year. A stage has been constructed by volunteers readying for this year's entertainment.

"We always had to rent a stage for Autumn on the River's live entertainment. Several volunteers spent a recent Saturday working to construct the stage. Many donations were received from local businesses and residents to cover the cost of construction," Abbott stated.

If live entertainment wasn't enough for you, then you are sure to find the deliciously yummy festival food like funnel cakes, roasted corn on the cob, popcorn, fish, cakes, pies and persimmon pudding. The Clark County Cattlemen will also be on hand serving up their delicious and ever popular ribeye steak sandwiches.

If you want to take a break and enjoy lunch or dinner you should visit the schoolhouse's basement. Volunteers will be serving up beans and cornbread and steamboat stew for a nominal fee.

"They are bringing back Steamboat Stew! I know you know what I am talking about. Nothing like a big bowl of Steamboat Stew!" Abbott grinned.

Before the kick off auction, you may get your energy with a delicious breakfast. The breakfast will be offered by Historic Bethlehem.

A Veteran's Tribute will be held at 2 p.m. The tribute is hosted by David Broughton and will feature the Color Guard from the American Legion Post 335.

"David really jumped in and supported Autumn on the River and other events we have hosted in Bethlehem. He has done a great job," Abbott praised.

The parade will have people lining the streets ready for the excitement and thrill of a parade. The Grand Marshal of this year's parade will be John Cable. He has been the Postmaster for the Bethlehem Post Office for the past 12 years. He recently retired from the job. The parade will begin at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday. According to Abbott, the festival committee is also offering a weekend getaway for camping enthusiasts.

"Many people like to come and stroll through the car and tractor show. We always have lots of people walking through and enjoying that part of the festival," Abbott said.

A flag display will also be available for viewing during the festival. Over 5,000 flags will be set up representing those soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice. Bill Hostetler, of the Clark County Sheriff's Department Inmate Program, has organized the display again this year.

"Bill has done a fine job over the last several years. He is continuing his tradition this year. It is always something to see when you look at all the flags so perfectly placed and then to realize what they represent," Abbott added. "I also want to thank Bill for his continuous help in bringing the inmate program to help with the set up of tents, booths and decorations for the festival. They also walk New Washington/ Bethlehem Road and clean the road frontage so it is a beautiful drive for those coming to visit Bethlehem. Thank you to Bill and Danny Rodden and the Clark County Sheriff's Department."

A silent auction will also be held during the two day festival. Inside the building are many school pictures, a tribute wall to Veterans, genealogy records, Bethlehem Township Church information and records and historical items from Bethlehem. Author Dana Olson will also be on hand to share his study of the pre-history of the area and his book on Prince Madoc. The Clark County Homemakers will raffle a quilt.

A scavenger hunt, "I Spy Historic Bethlehem" will also be held. More information regarding the scavenger hunt will be available at the Information Booth.

"I definitely encourage everyone to grab the kids, grandma, grandpa, aunts and uncles, and head down the hill to Bethlehem for this year's festival.
