Blaise has started a ride of his life as he pursues in passion of entertaining on stage and writing his own music.

While working at a call center he would sit and play the guitar. As he learned to play the guitar he was just trying to impress his ex-girlfriend.

“I learned to play the guitar on my ex-girlfriend’s Johnson guitar. It was bad. My fingers would be bleeding and everything. I was trying to impress her (ex-girlfriend) and be like look what I learned this week,” Blaise added.

His guitar lessons continued as he took lessons from Kevin Rees. After some lessons, Kevin asked Blaise the question that would give him the opportunity he was seeking. “Do you want to start a band together?,” Kevin asked Blaise.

“Kevin is a great mentor and a great guy. We played out like two times a month at KingFish on the River. We played older songs and music. It was all standard music. I had to learn what they all already knew,” Blaise said.

He added, “Kevin always told me that if you can stand on a street corner with you and just a

Blaise’s mother, Teri Bullock, sings back up harmony on his CDs and is also in the band at times.

As Blaise was mastering his craft, Kevin received an offer he could not pass up. Kevin was offered to fill in with a Jazz Band.

“Kevin told me I can’t continue with the band. I had to hard feelings. He had to do what was best for him,” Blaise stated. “But then I had to find something for me.”

After Kevin’s departure from the original band, Blaise took the opportunity to search for a new band. In the era of technology first, Blaise, a 2007 graduate of Silver Creek High School, did what any lead singer would do. He checked Craig’s List for a band looking for a lead singer.

“I searched Craig’s List. I contacted the guy. We talked for about two weeks about the audition. They needed a lead singer and guitarist,” Blaise recalled.

As fate would have it, Blaise was at the right place at the right time. He walked into a bar in Sellersburg and heard a band jamming on “Folsom Prison Blues.” Blaise described the sound of the band as “Honky Tonk Twang.” It was just what he was looking for.

“I just asked him if he would be interested in playing on a song,” Blaise added. “We talked through Facebook and then I finally met him at the audition for the band at Guitar Center in Louisville. We auditioned. I was just really anxious to get my name out there. I wanted to network and meet people with great connections.”

Blaise ended up deciding to fill in for Casey’s band but join the band he auditioned for. Although Casey decided to stay with his original band, Blaise was actually playing with two bands at one time.

“I kept thinking, these guys are talented. Casey is just phenomenal. Casey and his wife, Betty, were just married like a month before all this. So, this was all new to her also. All I kept thinking was how blessed I am. I was actually playing with two bands at one time,” Blaise stated.

Working with two bands at one time became a little much for Blaise and he made a tough decision. Blaise told the other band, after three rehearsals, he was going to join Casey’s band.

A decision that he has never regretted.
