

The trial of Tammy Spengler began last week in Washington Circuit Court.

Spengler is facing two counts of murder, two counts of aiding murder and one county of invasion of privacy.

Jury selection started May 9 and wrapped up that day.

The jury is made up of seven women and five men.

County Prosecutor Dustin Houchin said he expects the state to wrap up their portion of the case Monday, with the defense presenting their case Tuesday.

"I think it will wrap up this week," Houchin said. "Not sure which day. It's hard to say because I don't know what they (the defense) are going to put on."

The trial for Timothy R. Orman is set to start July 9.

Both Spengler and Orman were arrested for their alleged involvement in a double homicide that took place on Rosebud Road in June of 2011.

The bodies of Timothy M. Orman, Salem and Roy L. Orman, 48, Salem were found in a shed on the Rosebud Road property.

The homicide investigation began shortly after 11 p.m. Wednesday, June 22, 2011 when the Washington County Sheriff's Department received a phone call about two deceased people located on property on Rosebud Road, just off of West Washington School Road.

Washington County Sheriff's Deputies went to investigate and discovered the two bodies. At that point, detectives and crime scene investigators from the Indiana State Police Post at Sellersburg were called to the scene to assume the investigation.

After interviewing several

people and processing the crime scene a detective from the Indiana State Police Post at Sellersburg placed Orman and Spengler under arrest for murder.

Houchin said there will be a lot of similarities between this trial and the one scheduled to begin in July.

"Certainly all the forensic stuff is the same," he said. "It will cut down preparation time."

He said there haven't been any surprises to this point.

"We've gotten in what we wanted to get in and now it's just a wait and see," Houchin said.
