The Salem boys' basketball team is still in search of their first win after suffering their fourth consecutive loss to start the year.

The Lions fell to the visiting Jackets of Mitchell Friday 53-36.

Salem will try to regroup Friday when they open play in the county tournament at 6 p.m. against West Washington.

The Senators beat the Lions in both teams' season openers, but have dropped three straight.

The latest loss was against Paoli, 39-35, last Friday in Campbellsburg.

While West Washington won on Nov. 21, Salem leads the series 15-7 over the past 15 seasons.

Eastern is also limping into this weekend's county tournament.

They have just won one game and dropped four, one of which was a double over-time thriller against the team they face Friday, Borden.

The Braves are defending champs heading in and are the clear favorite to win the event again.
